Fifer enlisted in Company C, 33d Illinois in 1861, and he was severely wounded in battle at Jackson, Mississippi. He was mustered out of the service in 1864. He went to Wesleyan University, and was admitted to the bar. He was elected as the governor of Illinois in 1888. \$95.00

It appears as if the front wrap of the Burton item is missing. On the front of the copyright page Mr. Burton has written, "To Mrs. Mary Edwards Brown. My dear lady, You can keep this copy and thus give the other to your father & mother. Your & their kind words are appreciated. Sept. 1903 John E. Burton." The Mary Edwards Brown was the niece of Mary Todd Lincoln. At the age of 16 she helped care for Mary Lincoln in her last days. You really have to see this item to appreciate it. \$325.00

A PROCLAMATION.

BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF
AMERICA.

IN pursuance of the sixth section of the act of Congress entitled "An Act to suppress Insurrection, to punish Treason and Rebellion, to seize and confiscate the Property of Rebels, and for other Purposes," approved July 17, 1862, and which act, and the joint resolution explanatory thereof, are herewith published, I, [Abraham Lincoln](#), President of the United States, do hereby proclaim to and warn all persons within the contemplation of said sixth section to cease participating in, aiding, countenancing, or abetting the existing rebellion, or any rebellion, against the Government of the United States, and to return to their proper allegiance to the United States, on pain of the forfeitures and seizures as within and by said sixth section provided.

In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed.

Done at the City of Washington, this 25th day of July, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight [L.S.] hundred and sixty-two, and of the Independence of the United States the eighty-seventh.

He didn’t like slavery, but he was against President Lincoln’s Emancipation Proclamation. He felt that the confiscation of private property was unconstitutional, and that blacks were unprepared for freedom. He was defeated for re-election in 1864. Lincoln believed that he will vote against the 13th Amendment and calls him to the White House to talk with him about slavery. When

the vote on the 13th Amendment is taken, Yeaman votes “Aye”. His vote was the first swing state vote to abolish slavery. Later, President Johnson appointed Yeaman as ambassador to Denmark. \$500.00

Coleman, Townsend, and Kincaid

[J. Winston Coleman, Jr.](#) was born in Lexington, KY, on November 5, 1898. Besides having a job, he was the author of numerous books, articles, and pamphlets on Kentucky history and Kentucky personalities. In 1935 he left the construction business and retired to his Winburn Farm, and engaged in farming for the next 30 years. He and seven friends organized The Book Thieves, a literary group. One of his friends dubbed him the “Squire of Winburn Farm”, a title by which he was known ever since. I believe you will enjoy reading any of his writings. Mr. Colman passed away on May 4, 1983.

[William H. Townsend](#) was born on May 31, 1870, and died on July 25, 1964. Besides being an attorney, he was the author of several books about Abraham Lincoln and Cassius Clay. He also amassed a very impressive Lincoln collection. The February, 1943, issue of the Lincoln Herald has an excellent article written by his friend, J. Winston Coleman Jr., about the collection. I am sure that many of you have books in your collection written by Mr. Townsend.

[Robert L. Kincaid](#) was born on May 17, 1893, near Blairsville, Georgia. His father was a farmer, something Robert did not care to pursue. Instead, he worked at the Union County Banner, a newspaper in Blairsville. A friend of his got him into Lincoln Memorial University, where he excelled at everything he did. While there he was the editor of the Mountain Herald, which would later become the Lincoln Herald. Eventually, he became President of Lincoln Memorial University in 1947 until his retirement in 1958. He passed away on May 24, 1960.
